The Pasadena ISD Education Foundation Board of Directors is proud to present the 2018 Annual Report. Please take a brief moment to explore our past year of success and share in our continued efforts of providing support to the school children and educators of Pasadena for years to come.

Since 2003, the Education Foundation has helped bring dreams to life for educators and students alike while awarding $\$ 2,612,000.58$ in the form of 711 mini-grants given across the district. In addition to the $\mathbf{\$ 2 0 0}, \mathbf{8 1 1 . 0 0}$ in mini-grants awarded in 2018, the foundation distributed another $\mathbf{\$ 3 8 1 , 1 8 7 . 1 5}$ in designated donations and board approved funding for campus programs.

Though great strides have been made in helping to enhance the education of our students, for every bright idea submitted, there are more that do not get funded because monies are not available. In the years ahead, the foundation's challenge is to keep

building on our success and expand financial support provided to the programs for Pasadena ISD students. The foundation board of directors constantly strives to earn dollars through annual fundraising events and donations. We have broadened our scope to include grant requests to corporate and private foundations. The Finance Committee actively pursues safe, yet productive investment opportunities. We are always seeking new and untapped resources.

Also, the board recognized the service of the 3 chairpersons of our fundraising events - Kirk Lewis, Jack Bailey and Denise Jennings.


## BOARD OF DIRECTORS RETREAT

In March, President Steve Cote hosted a strategic planning session at The Tremont Hotel in Galveston for directors to map out strategies and fundraising events for the upcoming year. New directors were able to get to know the group and its policies while others enjoyed time with old friends.


## ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

In April, the Athletics Hall of Fame held their annual banquet. In addition to honoring outstanding alumni athletes from Pasadena, they also awarded two scholarships to 2018 senior student athletes. During the year, the HOF awarded three mini-grants to campus athletic programs who applied.

## SHINING STARS ACADEMIC RECOGNITION GALA

In May of 2018 the Education Foundation honored those seniors whose academics shine the brightest on their campus. Ten students with the highest grade point averages from each Pasadena ISD high school were invited along with their parents and the educator "who had the most impact on their education." It was a star-studded event with foundation donors, board members and the community all coming together to recognize the success and accomplishments of this elite group of young people and educators. LyondellBasell Houston Refining sponsors the event providing decorations and volunteers under the direction of Gala Chairperson Denise Jennings. To add to the excitement, once again Dennis and Michele Lamm of MDL Enterprises, Inc. donated computer devices for each student. Foundation supporter ABC Dental was honored as the 2018 Community Shining Star for their continued and outstanding support of PISD.



## TEXAS INVITATIONAL GOLF CLASSIC

In June, the 7th Annual Texas Invitational Golf Classic was held at Timber Creek Golf Club. The golf tournament was organized by Chairman Jack Bailey and committee to raise funds and awareness for the McDonald's Texas Invitational BasketballTournament. There was a full roster of teams, sponsors and hole sign sponsors adding over $\$ 35,000.00$ to the overall tournament income for 2018.


MARKETING AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS
Throughout the year, the foundation took the opportunity to set up booths at community events to spread awareness. In August, the Education Foundation took part in two events to create awareness and inform the community and employees about the foundation. At the NewTeacher Welcome, 10 lucky "first year" teachers were chosen in a random drawing for a $\$ 250$ gift card to use for classroom supplies. Promotional items and marketing materials were given to all booth visitors at this event as well as the Business Expo held at the Pasadena Convention Center hosted by the Pasadena Chamber of Commerce. Foundation board members volunteered to work a booth at each high school homecoming football game in effort to gain more awareness with parents and students' families.


## FOUNDATION LIAISON MEETING

The annual meeting of the foundation liaisons was held in September for campus representatives across the district. Those attending were given upcoming plans for the foundation. The liaisons help by getting the word out on their campus about the happenings of the foundation. They are instrumental in assisting with the Cornerstone Club Competition held in October.

## FOUNDATION AWARENESS MONTH

During the month of October, several events were held to heighten awareness of the PISD Education Foundation in the community and within the district.

A competition was held between campuses to see who could recruit the most members in the Cornerstone Club. The club is made up of district employees who contribute to the foundation by payroll deduction and one time donors. Winning campuses were awarded cash prizes and individual incentives were given to members whose
 names were randomly drawn. This year, Gulf Coast Educators Federal Credit Union donated t-shirts and hoodies to all Cornerstone Club members who met the annual donation requirement. Foundation directors donated gift cards that were awarded by random drawing to club members.


## MCDONALD'S TEXAS INVITATIONAL BASKETBALLTOURNAMENT

The McDonald's Texas Invitational Basketball Tournament is the primary fundraiser for the foundation. Run solely by volunteers and sponsored by local business, industry and corporations, it has become one of the most respected and sought after tournaments in the state. Set in 9 different venues, the 2018 tournament hosted 32 girls' teams and 48 boys' teams from Texas. New in 2018, the district live-streamed games at all venues for all 3 days. Co-hosted with Deer Park ISD for the seventh year, the tournament gave back approximately $\mathbf{\$ 2 2 0 , 0 0 0} \mathbf{0 0}$ to both foundations collectively.

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## THE MCDONALD'S TEXAS INVITATIONAL CHECK PRESENTATION The

McDonald's Texas Invitational Check Presentation was made at the February 2019 Pasadena ISD Board of Trustees Meeting celebrating the 2018 tournament's success. Steering Committee officials gave recognition to sponsors and volunteers with Bob Ellis being named Volunteer of the Year. Chairman Kirk Lewis presented the giant check to the Pasadena ISD Education Foundation in the amount of $\mathbf{\$ 1 7 4 , 1 0 4 . 2 9}$ which included $\mathbf{\$ 3 5 , 0 0 0}$ from the Texas Invitational Golf Classic. Another check was awarded to Deer Park ISD Education Foundation for \$45,897.97.


## PRIZE PARADE

In December of 2018, the Education Foundation "Prize Parade" surprised campuses across the district with the awarding of mini-grants to educators. Joined by high school cheerleaders and a drumline, this festive assembly of foundation directors and donors brought oversized checks to be presented to the classroom teacher or educator(s) who submitted the grant application. Altogether, over $\mathbf{\$ 2 0 0}, \mathbf{0 0 0} \mathbf{0 0}$ was awarded.
