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



PARK VIEW INTERMEDIATE Garrett Sanborne, John Muir	STEEL DRUM BAND SUPPLIES Park View Intermediate is the only intermediate school in the Pasadena area with an authentic Caribbean Steel Drum Band. The band performs several times a year at school functions and also off campus in the community. The Steel Drums themselves are on temporary loan from San Jacinto College Central, but the stands used to hold the drums (and the mallets to play them) are very old and need to be replaced.
