**649 MINI-GRANTS**

Since 2003, the Education Foundation has helped to bring dreams to life for educators and students alike while awarding \$2,379,496.00 in the form of 649 mini-grants given across the district. In addition to the \$186,647.00 in mini-grants awarded in 2017, the foundation distributed another \$203,887.00 in designated donations and board approved funding for campus programs.

Though great strides have been made in helping to enhance the education of our students, for every bright idea submitted, there are usually two more that do not get funded because monies are not there. In the years ahead, the foundation's challenge is to build on its initial success and expand financial support provided to the programs for Pasadena ISD students.

The foundation board of directors constantly strives to earn dollars through annual fundraising events and donations.

We have broadened our scope to include grant requests to corporate and private foundations. We are seeking new and untapped resources who will join our cause.

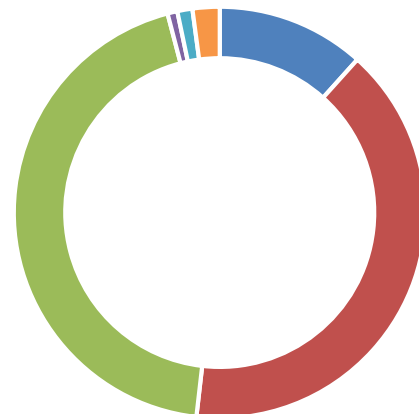
